## EVEN COMPUTERS GET THE FLU

We had a major computer problem in January, which has put me a week behind in all my computer-related projects. I'm sharing this experience in the hope I can help others avoid a similar disaster.

After slowing down and behaving oddly for several weeks, our computer stopped working entirely. A trip to a computer repair shop revealed the bad news: an infestation of computer viruses which had badly damaged our operating system. After several frustrating days, and a large bill, we got our computer back, cleaned up and with improved virus protection. It was a nasty and costly experience, and I'm offering myself as an object lesson in what NOT to do.

If you are a regular computer and internet user, you are almost certainly at risk for some of the same problems we encountered. Here's what you can do to protect yourself:

- 1) Get a good anti-virus program, pay for regular upgrades, and USE IT every time you turn your computer on! We started out doing this, then got careless, let our updates lapse . . .
- 2) If you spend a lot of time online, especially if you have DSL or a cable modem, consider getting a firewall installed.
- 3) DO NOT DOWNLOAD any file-sharing programs, like Kazaa. Many of them hide spyware and other nasty little programs. Even if you try to uninstall them, many viruses and spyware programs may be left behind to damage your system.
- 4) Be cautious about downloading ANY programs unless you are confident about the source.
- 5) If your computer starts behaving oddly, get it checked out promptly. If I'd done that a month ago, we might have avoided a total system collapse. A rash of pop-up ads and other anomalies should have been a clue that we had a problem. Unfortunately I didn't take it seriously enough.
- 6) And of course, the one thing I was always careful about: if you get e-mails from unknown sources, delete them, and empty your "recycle" or "deleted items" folder. Don't open any attachments unless you know what they are and who sent them. And NEVER open an .exe file, even if it seems to come from Microsoft or some other reputable source, unless you specifically asked for it and know exactly what it is.
- 7) Watch out for the many "virus hoaxes" out there. If you get a frantic e-mail from a friend telling you to delete a file on your computer, check with a reliable source ([www.snopes.com](http://www.snopes.com) is a good one) before you panic. Many of these "hoax" messages scare people into deleting harmless files and filling their friends' e-mail with warnings. In the meantime, the really bad viruses are sneaking in by the back door without any warning at all.
- 8) Even businesses with good virus protection can be infected, so here's the last, but perhaps most helpful precaution to take: BACK UP any data files (documents, pictures, music) that are really important to you. We all know we should do this, but do we do it?

Computer viruses are no fun at all, and unfortunately there are a lot of them around. Too many people think it's a challenge to create more and sneakier viruses. I hope my bad experience will be a wake-up call and help some of you to avoid something similar.
